### Awards / Accomplishments / Promotions / Appointments January 2016 Employee of the Month Detective Adam Gibson

2015 was a busy year for Detectives in general, but especially busy for Detective Gibson. He handled four homicide cases in 2015 alone. The first case was the death of 12 year old Ray Humphrey, Jr. on March 23<sup>rd</sup> at 1127 North 5<sup>th</sup> street. Steson Crider was convicted of the murder and sentenced to 65 years in prison. The second case occurred on July 4<sup>th</sup> at 635 College, in which Randy Bowser-Smith and Skylar Osborne were shot in the back. Gavin Masters was subsequently charged and convicted of this crime and was sentenced to 115 years in prison. The third homicide occurred on November 23, in which Carlous Wires, Sr. was shot twice in the head at his home located at 706 North 4<sup>th</sup>. This case is still under investigation. The fourth homicide case that Detective Gibson handled was the most recent, which occurred on December 7<sup>th</sup> involving the death of Billy Graham at 601 North 5<sup>th</sup>. The suspect, Derek McKenzie, was arrested within 24 hours of being taken into custody. Detective Gibson went to trial next in January 2016 for the homicide case involving Curtis Lovelace and the death of his wife, Corey Lovelace, on the morning of February 14, 2006. Detective Gibson was responsible for re-examination of this old case and developed new information and leads which lead to Lovelace being arrested for the crime in August of 2014.

All of these cases were being handled by Detective Gibson while still handling his primary duties as the Elder Service Officer. He has handled numerous cases involving the Exploitation of the Elderly which resulted in arrests and convictions in this area as well.

### **From Patrol**

#### **Information submitted by Lt. Dan DuHamel, Shift 1**

Sgt. Duane Long retired from the Quincy Police Department on February 1, 2016 after working his shift on January 28, 2016. Sgt. Long spent over 34 years with the department, with the last eleven as patrol sergeant.

On January 20, 2016, Officer Jeff Baird and Sgt. Folkenroth responded to the Microtel Motel, 200 S. 3<sup>rd</sup>, for the report of possible drug activity. The manager on duty reported that the guests in room #331 were supposed to have checked out at noon, but were still in the room at 1337 hours. Once on scene, Officer Baird and Sgt. Folkenroth encountered two females in the room. One of the females, identified as Katie M. Mickels (age 30) of Osage Beach, MO, tried to flee and was taken into custody. During a search of Mickels' person, an ounce of marijuana was located. Mickels also had numerous arrest warrants outstanding as well. The other subject, later identified as Shantel L. Thomas (age 27) of Hannibal, MO, lied about her name initially and was also found to have an outstanding warrant for her arrest as well. Mickels was ultimately lodged in the Adams County Jail on her warrants and on new charges of Resisting a Peace Officer, and for Felony Possession of Cannabis 10-30 Grams. Once at the jail, jail staff located a small amount of heroin on Mickels' person as well, and she was subsequently charged with Possession of a Controlled Substance as well. Thomas was lodged on her outstanding warrant and on a new charge of Obstructing Identification as well.

On January 31, 2016, Officers Erica Scott, Jeff Baird and Luke Humke were sent to an overdose call at 1611 Harrison supposedly involving three subjects. When

Officer. Scott arrived on scene, she was able to enter the residence through an unlocked back door and began searching for overdose victims. Sgt. Folkenroth then also arrived on scene to assist. While looking for overdose victims, Officer Scott observed numerous items of drug paraphernalia and suspected heroin in plain view. The homeowner, Mitchell Lammers, arrived on scene and signed a search waiver to his residence. During the consent search, numerous items used in the ingestion of heroin and approximately 5 grams of suspected heroin were seized from the residence. Lammers and one of his roommates, Christian Cullo, were taken into custody and charged with Unlawful Possession of a Controlled Substance and Possession of Drug Paraphernalia and lodged in the Adams County Jail. Another roommate, Cory Boots, has not yet been located and is also facing charges of heroin possession.

On January 29, 2016 at approximately 2035 hours, officers were dispatched to Texas Roadhouse with a report of an employee with a gun. Luis Lopez-Marin (the employee) had been in a physical altercation with another employee, left the business, and came back in with what witnesses described as a firearm in his waistband. He left shortly afterwards and was stopped by the Adams County Sheriff's Office on I-172. The vehicle was searched, but no firearm was located. The area around Texas Roadhouse, including the dumpsters, was searched as well. Lopez-Marin was questioned about the incident, but denied having a gun (four witnesses allegedly saw the handle of the firearm in his waistband). He was lodged in the Adams County Jail for Aggravated Battery, Aggravated Assault, and No Valid Driver's License.

On January 29, 2016 at 0036 hours, officers responded to 819 Chestnut Street in reference to a shooting. Upon arrival, officers found Devon Hawkins, 21, had received a single gunshot wound to the chest. Hawkins was in the rear second floor bedroom when he was struck. He was transported to the ER with a non-life threatening injury. He had been in an earlier verbal altercation with Quincy regulars.
