May 2015 Employee of the Month

Officer Terry Hagan joined the department on September 19, 2011. He graduated from Basic Police Training at ISP (Springfield, IL). He was selected as Employee of the Month on two other occasions. In addition, he received a Letter of Commendation due to his actions at a house fire. Officer Hagan is juvenile officer, member of the Crisis Intervention Team, a Breath Alcohol Operator, and a member of the Emergency Response Team. He is also a motorcycle officer.

On 04/29/15 at approximately 0210 hours, Officer Hagan conducted a traffic stop on a black Mitsubishi for driving without headlights. Officer Hagan recognized the subjects as being previously involved in drug activity and requested a K9 sniff of the vehicle. The K9 alerted on the vehicle and a subsequent search of the vehicle revealed approximately seven grams of ICE methamphetamine, digital scales, baggies,

and a loaded 9mm pistol with additional loaded magazines. The front seat passenger, whose wallet was found with the drugs, was arrested for Possession with Intent to Distribute Methamphetamine and Unlawful Use of a Weapon. The subject was lodged in the Adams County Jail. On 05/05/15, Officer Hagan traveled to Springfield, IL and testified in front of a Federal Grand Jury, indicting the subject on Federal weapons and drug charges.

Officer Hagan is an extremely busy officer, and usually leads his shift in calls for service received. Besides handling numerous calls, Officer Hagan still finds times to be proactive and conduct multiple traffic stops. Due to Officer Hagan's hard work, he was able to take another meth dealer and firearm off of the streets of Quincy. Additionally, due to Officer Hagan's dedication and willingness to testify in federal court on his off day, defendant Owsley will surely be dealt a more severe and just punishment for his crimes.

Patrol

Dayshift Squad 1:

On Jan. 6th, 2015, Officer Billingsley initiated a stolen vehicle investigation with April Meyer of SGL Motors. At the time, SGL Motors employees could provide no suspect information what so ever. Officer Billingsley began contacting area businesses in an attempt to generate leads. Officer Billingsley located footwear evidence and surveillance video that assisted him with putting the initial pieces of the puzzle together. Officer Billingsley discovered that the suspect went to the Shell gas station and borrowed a set of jumper cables while in the process of stealing the vehicle, a maroon 2005 Chrysler Pacifica minivan. Officer Billingsley obtained surveillance video from the gas station, along with the jumper cables used by the suspect. As the investigation progressed, Officer Billingsley worked with the Marion County Sheriff's Dept on a drive off that involved the stolen Chrysler

Pacifica that had license plates on it that had been stolen from a vehicle at the Quincy Medical Group. Officer Billingsley decided to utilize Quincy Regional Crime Stoppers to disseminate the video footage of the suspect. Shortly thereafter he was able to develop Demetrus Trass as a possible suspect. After analysis at the State Police Crime Lab, Trass' fingerprints were found on the jumper cables used by the suspect the day of the theft. The vehicle, which was eventually recovered in Chicago, had a black remote inside of it which also had a fingerprint on it belonging to Demetrus Trass. Officer Billingsley has continued to work with LE agencies in the Chicago area. Additional video of Trass, who had committed additional crimes, was obtained and is wearing the same clothing he had on the day of the theft. At this point a warrant has been issued for Demetrus Trass, who is currently in custody in Cook County. The warrant was issued in June of this year after Officer Billingsley's extensive investigative efforts. Officer Billingsley was nominated for employee of the month for this case.

Dayshift Squad 2:

On Saturday, June 6th, Officer Humke responded to an ambulance call at 1601 S. 24th #201 for a call of a 47-year-old female who was unconscious in a bathtub. The woman had recently had stents implanted a couple of weeks ago, and was completely unresponsive when Humke arrived on scene. Humke lifted the woman out of the bathtub and immediately used his AED per his training and delivered a shock. Humke then began CPR on the woman and was then assisted by the ambulance and fire crews that had arrived on scene. Humke was able to get the woman back into a normal sinus rhythm and saved her life. Officer Humke did a fantastic job on this call and needs to be recognized for going above and beyond the call of duty.

On Tuesday, June 30th, QPD received a call from Hannibal PD indicating that they had an Asian male subject pull a gun on a gas station employee at 0903 hours, because the employee refused service to the Asian male. The Asian male left in a blue Dodge SUV bearing IL Reg. #E314989, which registered back to a Kimlein Le of 3500 S. Glendale in Quincy. After receiving the call, the entire squad was mobilized to intercept this vehicle. A Pike County, IL deputy spotted the vehicle on I-172 and followed it into town where QPD then conducted a Felony stop on the vehicle on the John Wood Community College parking lot located at 48th & Harrison. A textbook Felony stop was executed and officers arrested the driver of the vehicle, a Duong D. Tran (09-05-73). Tran was wearing the identical clothing given to QPD by Hannibal P.D., and is facing charges in Hannibal for Armed Criminal Action. Tran was also highly intoxicated, and was arrested for a DUI by Officer Matt Mueller from the Illinois Secretary of State Police, as he had assisted on the stop as well. Tran refused to perform field sobriety tests and a search warrant had to be

obtained. Tran then refused the search warrant and was lodged on DUI and Obstructing Justice charges.
