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Awards / Accomplishments / Promotions / Appointments March 2016 Employee of the Month Officer Terry Hagan

Officer Hagan joined the department on September 19, 2011. He graduated from Basic Police Training at the Illinois State Police Academy in Springfield, IL. Officer Hagan was selected as Employee of the Month on two other occasions. In addition, he received a Letter of Commendation due to his actions at a house fire. Officer Hagan is a juvenile officer, member of the Crisis Intervention Team, a Breath Alcohol Operator, and a member of the Emergency Response Team. He is also a certified motorcycle officer. Officer Hagan was nominated for this award due to his actions on February 19, 2016. On that date, Officer Hagan was dispatched to a residence in the 800 block Cherry Street in reference to a possible AED event involving an unconscious male subject. Upon arrival, Officer Hagan checked the condition of the subject and found that he was breathing. He also conducted a visual check of the area and located a loaded handgun directly next to the subject. It was later determined that this handgun was stolen. He secured the handgun and called for additional units as he was assisting EMS with treating the patient. Two other subjects at the scene then began interfering with EMS treatment and with Officer Hagan's investigation. Officer Hagan arrested these two subjects and completed an investigation at the residence. The original subject was also arrested for possession of a stolen firearm after he was treated and released from Blessing Hospital. Officer Hagan's quick response and actions on scene not only helped to assist in treating a person in need of medical help, but also helped to secure a stolen firearm, and quash a volatile situation. This incident had a myriad of possibilities to end poorly, but due to Officer Hagan's actions it was resolved without injury to any citizen, arrestee, or first responder. This is but one example of Officer Hagan's abilities as a Patrol Officer. He is an extremely active officer, and usually leads his shift in calls for service received. Besides handling numerous calls, Officer Hagan still finds time to be proactive and conduct multiple traffic stops.

From Patrol

Shift 1, Squad 2

On March 31, 2016 at 1258 hours, officers responded to a remove a subject call at 629 Lind. The caller stated that Travis Oenning was at the residence and was actively involved in making methamphetamine. When officers arrived on scene, they took Oenning into custody for trespassing, and located all of the components for a methamphetamine lab on Oenning's person and in the backpack he was carrying. Oenning was attempting to manufacture methamphetamine inside the caller's residence while two small children were present in the home. Oenning was charged with Aggravated Participation in Methamphetamine Manufacturing (a Class X felony punishable by six to 30 years in the Department of Corrections) and was lodged in the Adams County Jail.

On March 4, 2016, Officers Pavon and Hufford went to 2023 ½ Broadway to follow-up on a burglary case that Officer Hufford initially took in November 2015. While Officers Pavon and Hufford were conducting an investigation into this case, they conducted a consent search of the residence. While searching, they located numerous other items that they had suspicion were stolen. Furthermore, they located numerous items commonly used to consume cannabis and methamphetamine. On March 5, 2016, Officer Pavon was dispatched to a burglary to a garage. While taking this report, he found that many of the items that were being reported stolen, he saw the previous day at 2023 ½ Broadway. Officers Pavon and Hufford later located the suspect, Cody Felker, and questioned him about the burglaries and illegal drug items. Felker admitted to having a methamphetamine addiction, burglarizing a garage, and helping store, pawn, and sell stolen merchandise. Felker was ultimately charged with two counts of burglary and possession of methamphetamine and an accomplice will also be facing charges. Due to Officers Pavon and Hufford's initial investigation and their motivation to follow-up on their investigation, subjects who were burglarizing and using illegal drugs were arrested and some stolen property was returned to its rightful owners.

On March 14, 2016 at approximately 9:34 p.m., Officers Ebbing and Hodges, as well as other QPD officer, Adams County Sheriff's deputies and Task Force officers, executed a search warrant at 1310 N 8th Street. Upon making entry, officers located two subjects in the residence. Upon searching the residence, officers located an

extensive hydroponic cannabis grow operation in the basement and seized over 30 cannabis plants. The cannabis grow was complete with its own plumbing, ductwork, and heating/air system, along with wide array of grow chemicals and fertilizers. Additionally, officers located and sized over 500 grams of processed cannabis and plant material separate from the plants. The grow operation took multiple officers over 3 hours to document and dismantle. Officers Ebbing and Hodges spent many more hours logging truckloads of evidence. The resident, Daniel P. Baird, was arrested for Unlawful Production of Cannabis Plants (20-50 plants) and Unlawful Possession of Cannabis with Intent to Distribute (500-2000 grams). The other subject located at the residence, Kristi M. Evans, was arrested for Possession of Drug Paraphernalia and was released on cash bond. A search of the IL Department of Corrections website shows Evans is currently on Parole for a 2014 Meth conviction.

On Friday, March 25, 2016, Officers Bemis and Logsdon were assigned a burglary to motor vehicle report at about 0450 hours. The victim reported that he had parked in the Blessing Hospital parking lot overnight and found that several pieces of luggage had been stolen from his truck. Included in the luggage was a Remington 870 shotgun, minus the barrel. Officer Bemis contacted Blessing Hospital Security to check to see if there was surveillance video of the incident. They found that there was, and that the suspect vehicle was still parked in the parking lot. Officers Bemis and Logsdon located the vehicle's owner, Tia Jackson, a Blessing Hospital employee, who denied any knowledge of the burglary or of where the suspect, Clyde Boerenson, could be located. Consent to search the car was obtained, and items from the truck were found in the trunk of the car. After Jackson's story failed to hold water, they went to her residence to try and locate her and Boerenson. After getting no response, a search warrant was obtained for the residence. Most of the items stolen from the truck were eventually located several yards away. Clyde Boerenson eventually confessed to the burglary but would not admit to knowing the whereabouts of the shotgun. Boerenson was arrested for Burglary to Motor Vehicle and Tia Jackson was arrested for Obstructing Justice. Both were lodged. These officers did a great job with this investigation. Had they waited until they came back from off days to check on the video, they likely would not have developed a suspect as quickly as they did, nor would they have recovered as much of the victim's property as they did. In addition, both Officer Bemis and Officer Logsdon had worked almost 11 hours of their 12 hours shift before taking the report. The investigation kept both officers here until mid to late afternoon the following day. I believe both Officer Bemis and Officer Logsdon should be considered for employee of the month for their hard work and willingness to go above and beyond to ensure the case was thoroughly investigated and brought to a positive conclusion.

On Saturday, March 26, 2016, Officers Hummel and Barnard, along with Sgt. Wheeler, responded to and handled a fatality motorcycle versus car accident on 54th Street in front of Menard's. These accidents are difficult to handle due to the devastation observed at the scene, but also dealing with the emotions of all involved. Officer Hummel, along with two bystanders, performed CPR on the

motorcyclist until EMS arrived. Unfortunately, his injuries were too severe to survive.

On March 28, Lt. Schisler, Sgt. Elbus, and Officer Hagan met with representatives of the Grandview Church Youth Ministries and discussed ways to keep the kids safe after Wednesday night fellowship, and also about officers interacting with the kids on Wednesday nights.
