Awards / Accomplishments / Promotions / Appointments October 2015 Employee of the Month Detective Adam Gibson and Officer Craig Russell

Detective Gibson joined the department on December 30, 1997. He has been a Task Force Inspector, a K-9 Officer, and is currently the Elder Service Officer. Officer Russell joined the department on September 19, 2011. He is currently a K-9 officer on the night shift. Detective Gibson and Officer Russell were nominated for this recognition due to their outstanding work in arresting three violent juveniles offenders with gang connections. The youthful offenders were in town after a crime spree in Davenport, IA, and were taken off the street before they could victimize the citizens of Quincy. On September 21, 2015, the Quincy Police Department received information from the Davenport (IA) Police Department regarding two violent juvenile male offenders, who were wanted in Davenport for Robbery and weapon offenses. After receiving the information, Officer Russell spotted one of the suspects in Quincy, but was unable to apprehend him at the time. Officer Russell looked up both suspects on Facebook, and found pictures of them at a house in Quincy. Officer Russell then began developing a strategy to locate the suspects the next night. On September 22nd Officer Russell contacted Detective Gibson, who was working the Proactive detail on the northwest end of town, and briefed him on the Davenport fugitives. After locating the suspects at 6th & Cherry, Detective Gibson and Officer Russell made contact with them in the 500 block of Cherry Street. Additional officers responded to the area, as these suspects had been reported as armed and dangerous. The officers were able to identify the two suspects who were each wanted on warrants for Robbery and Intimidation with a Dangerous Weapon. During the encounter with the two, one of their friends then dropped a baggie containing a white chunky substance onto the street. That subject was identified and was also from Davenport, IA. The substance in the baggie turned out to be 4.7 grams of crack cocaine packaged for sale. All three juveniles were taken into custody and ultimately lodged in the Adams County Juvenile Detention Center. A set of car keys was located on one of them. Officers then checked the area using the key fob remote, and located a 2013 Ford registered to an address in Bettendorf, IA parked at 6th & Lind. The vehicle had been reported stolen the previous day following a crime spree where numerous vehicles had been stolen. The suspects and their crew have been implicated in the crime wave in both the Davenport and Bettendorf areas.

Dayshift Squad 2:

On 09-21-15, the Quincy Police Department received information from the Davenport (IA) Police Department regarding two violent juvenile males who were wanted by Davenport Police Department robbery and weapon offenses. After receiving the information from Davenport, Officer Russell spotted one of the suspects, Demetrius J. Allen, on the north end of town, but was unable to apprehend him at the time due to a communication issue with dispatch. Officer Russell then looked up both Demetrius Allen and his cohort, Jason Ruplinger, on Facebook and found pictures of both subjects at a house in Quincy. Officer Russell then began developing a strategy to locate the suspects on 09-22-15. Officer Russell then contacted Detective Gibson, who was working the Proactive detail on the northwest end of town, and briefed Detective Gibson on the Davenport fugitives.

Detective Gibson was then able to locate the suspects at 6th and Cherry, and he and Officer Russell then got out with the suspects in the 500 block of Cherry Street. Additional officers responded to the area, as these suspects had been reported as armed and dangerous. Officer Russell and Detective Gibson were able to identify Allen and Ruplinger, who were each wanted on warrants for Robbery and Intimidation with a Dangerous Weapon. During the encounter with Allen and Ruplinger, one of Allen and Ruplinger's friends then dropped a baggie containing a white chunky substance onto the street. That subject was identified as Kendrick E. Lee (06-23-00), who was also from Davenport, IA. The substance in the baggie turned out to be 4.7 grams of crack cocaine packaged for sale. All three subjects (Allen, Ruplinger, and Lee) were taken into custody and a set of car keys was located on one of the suspects. Officers then checked the area using the key fob remote and found that the key fob belonged to a 2013 Ford registered to an address in Bettendorf, IA that was parked at 6th and Lind. The 2013 Ford had been reported as

stolen on 09-21-15 during a crime spree where numerous vehicles had been stolen. Allen, Ruplinger, and their crew have been implicated in the crime wave in both the Davenport and Bettendorf Iowa areas. Allen, Ruplinger, and Lee were all lodged in the Adams County Juvenile Detention Center.
