Detective Nick Eddy

Detective Eddy was nominated due to a sexual assault investigation. In January of 2018, Detective Eddy was assigned to investigate a sexual assault case where Richard Hood was a suspect. He conducted multiple interviews, wrote and executed several search warrants, and was able to secure an arrest warrant for Hood by the end of February, 2018. On April 9th, 2019 and Adams County Jury found Hood guilty of three counts of criminal sexual assault and one count of unlawful restraint after a two-day trial. On September 13th, Hood was sentenced to nine years and eight months for each count of criminal sexual assault, and one year for unlawful restraint. Due to Detective Eddy's patience and persistence, a violent predator with a lengthy criminal history has been removed from our society for the foreseeable future.
